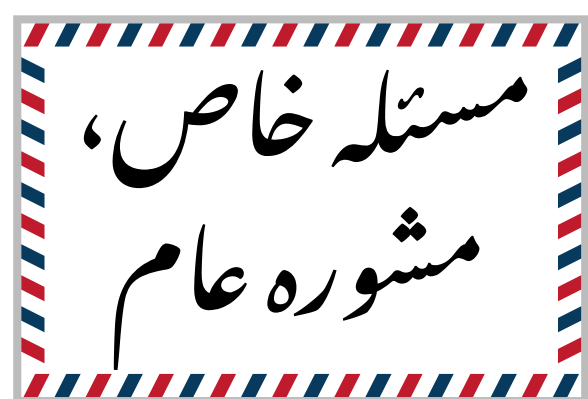

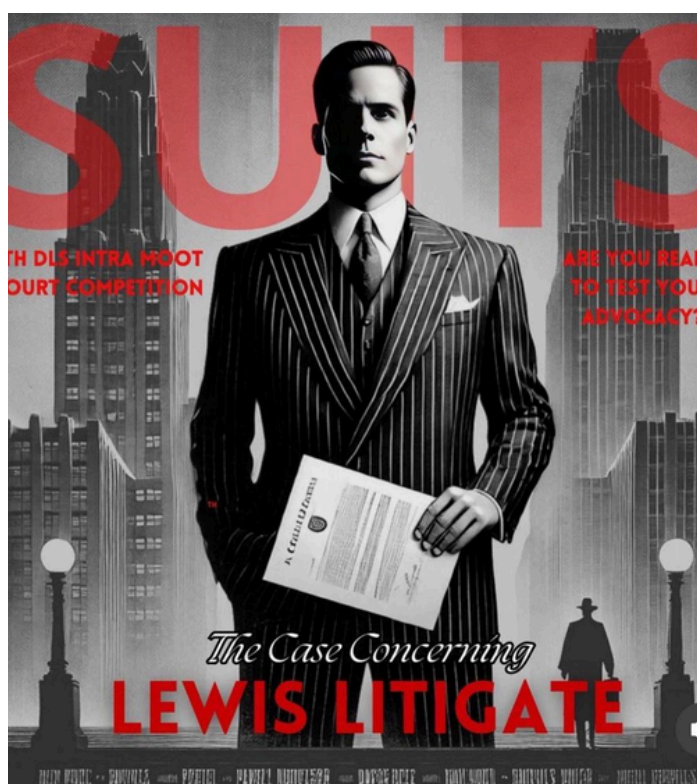

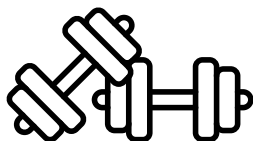

Intra Moot-Court Competition

“Legal Minds Soar: Denning’s 7th Intra-Moot Unleashes Future Advocates”

Denning has long played a pivotal role in shaping skilled advocates, with its intra-moot competition offering students a rich, hands-on experience to grasp the intricate art of litigation. This tradition has helped countless students develop a deep understanding of courtroom dynamics and sharpen their advocacy skills.

On Friday, the 8th of November, Denning hosted its 7th intra-moot at the PECHS campus, during which a total of 80 teams registered.

With participation levels higher than ever, the event’s scale presented both excitement and logistical challenges. “We’ve probably had the record number of participants throughout the entire city this time around,” said Mr. Zaman Khan, Patron of the Mooting Society. Vice President of the society, Mr. Musharraf Sarhandi, echoed this enthusiasm, adding, “We maybe had nearly double the amount of students we did last time.”

Behind the Scenes: Organizing a Grand Event

To accommodate this influx, the executive body started planning well in advance. “The executive body began working on the event since the 19th of October to ensure a streamlined event,” Mr. Sarhandi explained. Though he acknowledged the challenges: “We had a lot of trouble managing logistics for such a grand event, and many of our volunteers were first-years, lacking the experience we were hoping for.”

Despite these obstacles, the competition moved forward with students immersed in last-minute practice, pacing hallways and stairwells while honing their arguments. “It’s a lot of people’s first time participating, including myself, so nervousness is something that shouldn’t be surprising,” admitted Mr. Hidesh, a first-year participant.

Nerves, Insights, and Growth in the Preliminary Rounds

In the preliminary rounds, judges observed mixed performances, with nervousness initially affecting the delivery of many students. Mr. Aimal Rashid, one of the judges at the competition who assessed oral arguments, noted a distinct improvement:

“They did not have proper grip over the facts and application of the law in the first round, but by the second round, they had a better command and produced stronger arguments.”

Senior students recognized the team-oriented nature of the competition. “There’s immense drafting and research involved, along with separate oral rounds, so it’s definitely not possible for an individual. Teamwork is necessary to divide the workload,” said Ms. Wareesha Maryam, a third-year student. She credited the competition with significantly boosting her speaking, drafting, and teamwork skills. As Day Two arrived, the initial rush began to calm, with fewer participants in the hallways as many advanced to the next rounds. “I think a lot of people have finally figured out how to calm their nerves,” remarked one participant. The organizing team also found the day easier to manage. “Today is a lot easier for us in contrast to yesterday as there are fewer students to deal with,” said Mr. Shahzaib, an organizing committee member.

Rising to the Challenge in the Final Rounds

The final day of the competition welcomed renowned advocates and barristers, including Mr. Shahab Sarki, Ms. Shazia Kasi, Mr. Haider Waheed and Mr. Omer Soomro, with the guest of honor, Mr. Justice Iqbal Kalhor, Judge of the Hon’ble High Court of Sindh joining to witness the climactic rounds. The tension was palpable as the remaining participants faced off in a test of wit and legal acumen, striving to impress the judges and secure the top spot.

Reflecting on the intense level of scrutiny, many seasoned mooters noted a particularly challenging experience. Mr. Khan explained, “We don’t just have a lot of senior members of the bar as part of our team, but also experienced mooters, which is why we’ve had a very ‘hot bench,’ you could say.” Ultimately, the coveted win went to Team ICM-007, affectionately dubbed the “James Bond team” by their peers.

First-year participant Ms. Samea Bint Sahban, who won the Best Speaker award, credited her coaches for her success. “Credit goes to our coaches who helped us prepare day in and day out so we wouldn’t get sandbagged with anything,” she said confidently.

Closing Ceremony: Recognition and Reflection

The competition concluded with a closing ceremony where Mr. Huzaifa Muqadam, Director of Academic at Denning, acknowledged the support staff(s) role in the event’s success—a first for the competition. Reflecting on the overall performance, Mr. Khan shared his insights: “Almost all students were conceptually strong. However, I noticed some lapses in courtroom etiquette. There’s a specific style to dealing with judges. I encourage students not to rely too heavily on fully prepared scripts but to use pointers and memos for more fluidity.”

He noted that some participants struggled with responding to questions due to over-reliance on memorized scripts. “A lot of students had difficulties in answering questions by judges because of this exact reason,” he commented, urging students to take feedback constructively for their future advocacy pursuits.

As the competition drew to a close, participants left with valuable lessons and motivation for the year ahead. Mr. Rohan Latif, a member of the “Best Emerging Team,” expressed optimism: “This was a learning experience for us, and we’re walking away happy with the result we achieved because it pushes us to do better the next time.”

With a successful event wrapped up, Mr. Khan reflected on the hard work and dedication shown by all involved. “I’m very happy with how the event turned out; everything was done to the exact minute,” he said, already looking forward to next year’s competition and the continued growth of Denning’s future advocates.

Being ‘human’ can be overwhelming, burdening, and frustrating at times. There might be times where you catch yourself unable to assess and handle the situation as effectively as one would hope; times where you catch yourself thinking, “Ah, I should’ve said this instead of that” or situations where you only see a ‘burning red’ because of someone else’s actions.

Worry not though, for such moments are not a sign of weakness, rather a sign of ‘human’. But what could such internal statements and criticisms mean? What does ‘being human’ truly entail? Does it mean to act with unrelenting righteousness like the idealistic heroes of our childhood stories, or is it something entirely different?

Simply put, being human means to act as humans do. However, these actions are limited to our knowledge of understanding a situation, person, time, or place. On this note, we shall introduce the first dose of vitamin s: “The art of comprehension.”

A person can behave only to the extent of his understanding or perhaps only as much as he wishes to understand.

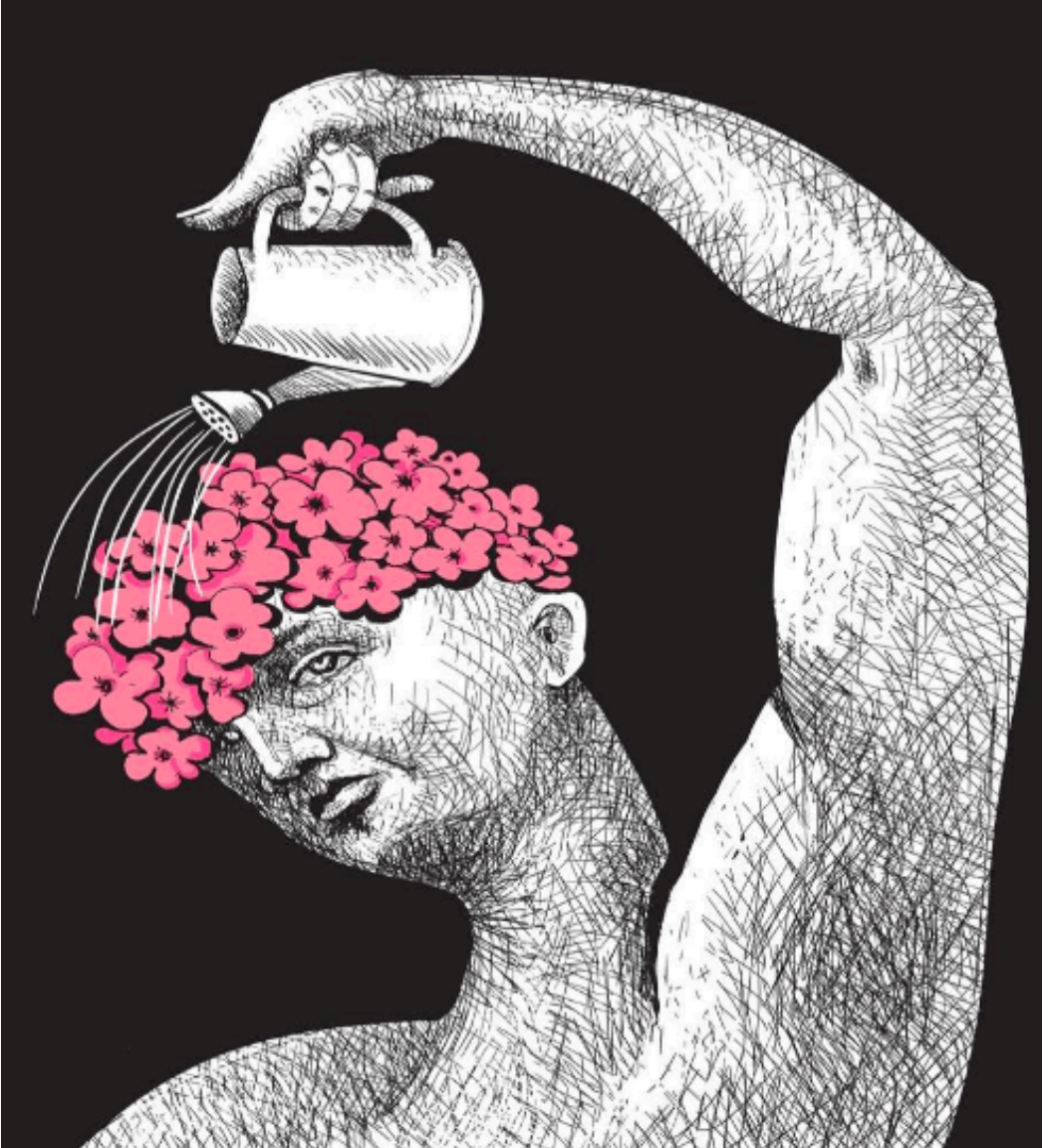
For instance, suppose you’ve been having trouble with your eyes and you decide to go to an optometrist for help. After briefly listening to your complaint, he takes off his glasses and hands them over to you.

“Put these on,” he says. “I’ve worn this pair of glasses for ten years now and they’ve really helped me. I have an extra pair at home; you can wear these.”

So you put them on, but it only makes the problem worse.

This is terrible!” you exclaim. “I can’t see a thing!”

“Well, what’s wrong?” he asks.



“They work great for me. Try harder.”

“I am trying,” you insist. “Everything is a blur.”

“Well, what’s the matter with you? Think positively,” he says in disbelief.

“I positively can’t see a thing,” you cry.

“Boy, are you ungrateful!” he chides. “after all I’ve done to help you!”

Now, what are the chances you’d go back to this optometrist the next time you needed help? Not very good, I would imagine. You don’t have much confidence in someone who doesn’t diagnose before he or she prescribes.

But how often do we diagnose before we prescribe in communication?

~ excerpt from *The 7 habits of Highly Effective People: Habit 5: “seek first to understand, then to be understood.”*

Now, there are an infinite ways in which the above example can be interpreted, but let’s take the most blaringly obvious one, asked by the question in the end.

How often do we ‘actually’ listen to another person without comprehending it in a personal way?

How often do we show true empathy in the face of another, the ability to understand someone with the absence of prejudice, to understand their choice of actions, as unjustified or ignorant as they may be?

Another question pondered in the above-mentioned book asks, “What training or education have you had that enables you to listen so that you really, deeply understand another human being from that individual’s own frame of reference?”

In a world where apathy is a fast-growing trend, such an ability is slowly becoming a rare attribute. However, that shouldn’t be the case. Understanding is the first step to ‘being human’.

Losing such a trait, ironically welcomes cruelty not just for others, but to one’s own self. Human emotions that you regard as ‘bad’ such as ‘anger, jealousy, etc.’, will have no room for improvement, but rather will be harshly cast aside, never to be understood and overcome.

Before long, these bottled emotions will weigh on you, press down on your growth until you too will become like the optometrist: ignorant to others’ pain, unable to diagnose the issue at hand and only able to offer a solution that is outdated or something regarded entirely as ‘selfish, narcissistic, and cruel.’

Hence, it is important that we, as humans, take a ‘dose’ or the steps to understand ourselves, one another, better. Surprisingly, the first step is the easiest as much as much as it’s the hardest. Just ask; communicate with yourself and then others.

Simple questions can truly go a long way. Start by asking yourself “why?” for that moment you saw ‘red’, followed by a “was it right?”

Begin by questioning the questions that clog your mind, fighting your own prejudice, understanding why you are reacting to certain things the way you do, and forgiving yourself for ‘being human,’ for it is only then that you can become more human.

Denning Triumphs at the 6th Culligan Throwball Tournament ‘24

Pakistan Sports Board Ground, November 8-9, 2024

The 6th Culligan Throwball Tournament concluded with Denning’s Team A securing first place in a thrilling showdown, while Team B showcased impressive skill, securing a commendable fourth place overall.

Organized at the Pakistan Sports Board ground, the tournament saw competitive teams from various institutions such as IOBM and Greenwich, with the final match day delivering riveting performances from all participants.

Pool Rounds: A Fierce Start

The tournament kicked off with Denning’s Team A facing off against IOBM in Pool A’s opening round. Rawan’s early two consecutive scores set the pace, while Muhaddisa contributed two initial points. However, there were some errors, including an unfortunate collision between Maryam and Rawan which handed key points to IOBM, ultimately allowing them to secure a 15-11 win in the first round.

In the second set, Team A regrouped, with Muhaddisa scoring two consecutive serves, but persistent errors, including a missed catch by Zehra and a wayward serve, allowed IOBM to maintain their lead. Despite strategic timeouts led by Coach Sir Ivan, IOBM clinched the round with a score of 15-10, claiming victory.

However, Denning’s Team A managed to qualify for the semi-finals based on aggregate scores, reflecting their resilience and team spirit.



Meanwhile, in Pool B, Denning’s Team B stunned the crowd with back-to-back victories against IOBM’s Team B, winning both sets decisively at 15-7 and 15-10. From Classrooms to Careers

Legal rights aren't just ink on paper; they're lifelines for those fighting to be seen, heard, and respected. Ms. Dua Mangi on embracing her journey from legal aspirations to Advocacy for empowerment

Ms. Mangi's journey into Law started with a simple yet burning question; "How can I contribute to making legal rights a reality for women?" The very question led Ms. Mangi to explore certain courses abroad which further strengthened and ignited her passion for Law. As she delved deeper into the field, Ms. Mangi became captivated by the complexity of legal reasoning, finding herself drawn to the critical thinking and depth it required.

Early on, Ms. Mangi explored various paths within the profession. A pivotal internship confirmed for her that traditional courtroom practice wasn't the right fit, prompting her to look toward corporate or in-house roles where she could align her work with her commitment to women's empowerment. This search eventually led her to the National Accountability Bureau (NAB), where she found her ideal role. She feels that she resonates with NAB's mission to tackle white-collar crime and fight corruption.

For now, Ms. Mangi has decided not to pursue a master's degree. With the growing emphasis on skills over degrees, she believes that gaining practical experience will better prepare her for the job market. However, she acknowledges the advantages of further study, particularly in government roles like NAB, where promotions may depend on advanced qualifications.

Reflecting on her law school experience, Ms. Mangi considers those days some of the best of her life, filled with cherished memories. She appreciates the supportive environment provided by her law school, where the Denning Circle for the Advancement of Women (DCAW) was born, a society dedicated to empowering women which was led by her as the vice president.

A journey filled with invaluable life lessons

Ms. Mangi states that, "one of the biggest surprises has been encountering people from all walks of life. It can be both a blessing and a challenge; sometimes, you find traits you admire and want to adopt, while other times, you encounter individuals who make you realize exactly what you don't want to be like." Coming from a supportive environment at Denning, Ms. Mangi initially found it difficult to adjust to less collaborative spaces, but this taught her the importance of setting boundaries. An insight given by Ms. Mangi is that when she is asked for legal advice, her immediate reaction is "not jumping to answer immediately" as she prefers to research first and offer a well-rounded response with all possible angles considered.

Legal field: Glamorous as Legally Blonde or not so much?

If law school experience were a show, Ms. Mangi imagines it would have more of a wholesome, sitcom vibe than a typical legal thriller in which Dua Lipa would play the lead. Initially she expected the legal field to be as glamorous as shown in "Legally Blonde" and "Suits," but she quickly realized that practicing law is a challenging, demanding profession that requires dedication.

Striving for things beyond financial gain, an advice to future lawyers.

Ms. Mangi believes that in this lucrative field, "There's a unique satisfaction in knowing I've provided someone with sound legal advice and eased their concerns." However, she does sets boundaries to avoid being taken advantage of in terms of free legal advice. Her advice to fresh graduates is to stay patient, trust the process, and remember to balance work and personal life for sustainable success. Her advise

to law students is to start studying from day one, review material regularly, take thorough notes, and stay engaged in discussions.

'Women card' A myth!

Ms Mangi, strongly advocates for dismantling the myth that women in law advance by leveraging the "women card" to evade accountability or earn unmerited advantages. She argues that while "benevolent sexism" might offer superficial help under the guise of protection, it ultimately reinforces outdated stereotypes, undermining women's genuine achievements. Whilst emphasizing that true progress stems from talent, hard work, and dedication, she calls for a legal environment that respects women's individuality, challenging stereotypes that equate femininity with a lack of professionalism. In her view, embracing diversity in demeanor and style among women in courtrooms would foster a more inclusive and balanced perspective within the legal profession.

An arrogant lawyer, a good lawyer?

The misconception that has rooted its place is that "a good lawyer is arrogant or always knows the answers". Whilst Ms. Mangi believes that in reality, success in law demands rigorous preparation, humility, and continuous learning. The best lawyers listen, communicate effectively, and focus on understanding complex cases, not just projecting confidence. True legal skill, she emphasizes, comes from dedication and a commitment to growth—not an inflated ego.

Being your own best.

Ms. Mangi acknowledges the intense workload lawyers face, often without weekends off, and envisions a shorter workweek to boost mental health and job satisfaction. She emphasizes that it's not about being the best, but about being her best. By focusing on personal growth over comparison, she combats imposter syndrome and builds resilience. This perspective allows her to define success on her own terms, finding motivation and fulfillment in her unique journey and celebrating progress, no matter how small.

“Ban Smoking—But Only in the Streets of Paris”

- Mr. Ali Arbi on His Journey to Making Law

“Before law, my life was full of question marks; after law, it is equipped with the tools to seek answers.”

Meet Mr. Ali Arbi, whose life is best described by the movie title *“Mission Impossible;”* a distinguished alumnus from Denning ’s extensive alumni network who embarked on his legal journey just 2 weeks after graduating to pursue his LLM and SQE. Having passed the first SQE exam, he is currently working as a paralegal at Loxley Solicitors. There, he is completing his two years of qualifying work experience while preparing to sit for SQE 2.

Reflecting on his time at Denning, Mr. Arbi shared,

“My time at Denning was partly academic and partly filled with extra curriculars. Among the various skills I acquired, the most important was recognizing my potential—not merely for personal or professional achievements, but the ability to handle more than I initially thought possible. I removed the phrase ‘I can’t do it’ from my life.” He further added that he learned everything he possibly could during law school: *“If I didn’t learn something during my time at Denning, it was probably something law school couldn’t teach.”*

Though he humbly acknowledges he’s still in the early stages of his career, he encourages aspiring lawyers to avoid setting limits on themselves. Mr. Arbi offered valuable advice on networking, urging students to *“talk to people.”* He explained that, unfortunately, some individuals may only respond if they see immediate value in you, often requiring a bit of ego-stroking. *“Ignore that half of the population,”* he advised, *“The rest of the population is approachable. Seek advice from people—whether they’re juniors, seniors, or professionals in the field. You never know what advice will resonate with you.”*

He stressed the importance of using LinkedIn to build connections, suggesting students interact with posts, follow up with people who can help, and find common ground before starting a conversation, and added, *“I can’t guarantee this will work every time—it depends on who the other person is. But if you knock on enough doors, some will open.”*

Mr. Arbi also highlighted opportunities like moot court competitions and involvement in student organizations as ways to showcase skills to potential employers.

“It’s all about how often these employers see your face or hear your name,” he noted. *“This networking approach is essential, whether you’re a law student or a lawyer trying to build a client base.”*

To maximize their time at law school, Mr. Arbi encourages students to “get as much experience as they can.” He advises students to be open to different practice areas, as exposure to a variety of legal work could lead to unexpected career paths.

“Your work experience demonstrates whether you’re committed to law or not and helps you answer the most difficult question: Why Law? And if you are lucky, your first paycheck would make you feel like Harvey Specter but one who can only afford Ramen Noodles for a week.”

He also emphasized the importance of maintaining a balance between work and life.

“Work is but a part of your life. Don’t make it your entire life. Friends and family are most important, and the more stable your life outside of work, the more efficient you’ll be in it.”

Arbi’s strongest ally in this balance? Coffee. He shared his own habits, like spending time with friends and family, trying new restaurants, and setting aside time for self-care and vacations, noting that an *“exhausted you is of no use to anyone.”*

While Mr. Arbi fondly remembers the camaraderie and thrill of mooting competitions, he acknowledges that real-world practice offers unique excitement.

Despite the nostalgia, he advises students to *“enter each new stage of your life and career with the same energy and curiosity, forgetting what you’ve learned before.”*

Though the legal world includes its fair share of repetitive administrative work, he encourages young lawyers to manifest their passion for the law. *“Law can be whatever you want it to be—yes, even like Suits, if you want it to be, minus the drama.”*

For students looking for advice on navigating their own journeys in law, Mr. Ali Arbi’s words offer both inspiration and a grounded perspective on what lies ahead.

Election 2024: Red, Blue, and the Uncharted Path Ahead for the US

The American Constitution & Trump in White House

The American Constitution, unlike the UK Constitution, is a codified constitution. It may seem to be the only difference, but there is also another major difference. The US constitution follows a presidential style of government, whereas UK has a parliamentary style of Government. This article will be giving a brief insight into the US constitution and the recent elections in the United States which lead to Donald Trump being the 47th US President.

The US constitution is based upon trichotomy of powers, with distinct legislature, executive and judiciary. The executive role is played by the President; the legislative role is played by the Congress and the judicial role is played by the Supreme Court of the US.

Presidential Style of Government

In the presidential style of government as in the US, the Congress (Legislature) and the President (Executive) are completely separate from one another. The President is elected for a term of four years by the electoral college, which is independent of the Congress. The Congress, on the other hand, comprises of House of Representatives, where the members are

elected from each of the states based upon the population, while the Senate has 100 members, with each state having two senators representing their state.

US Presidential Elections

In the US, it is a political tradition that there would be an electoral battle between the Democrats and Republicans. This year, the Republican candidate for the President was Donald Trump and the Democratic candidate was Kamala Harris. Donald Trump won the elections 312 votes from the electoral college, while Harris won 226 votes allowing the Democrats to have their president.

Congress Elections

The presidential elections were also coupled together with elections in both the houses of Congress, where the Republican Party has won the majority seats in Senate. The elections for the House of Representatives are still underway – In order to have simple majority in the House, the party needs to have 218 seats. So far, the race is being lead by Republican with already having 214 seats. The Republican led Congress will create a bit of stir for the Democratic led executive.

Trump’s America First Approach & What it means for the world

One of the most popular slogan in the American elections was the *“Putting America First”* – the slogan raised by Trump. This policy would mean that US will now be focusing on its internal growth as opposed to having a control over international relations and most importantly, international armed conflict. Trump has already shown his disinterest in the Middle eastern war as well as Ukraine – Russia war, as well as promised not to drag US into any other international armed conflict. This change would be a welcome change for the world, but one needs to be careful about the stance of Europe and China in this regard. Another major policy of Trump is to impose heavy taxes and duties on imported goods, which will cause domestic inflation to go up and will also affect the global supply chain for major commodities.

Trump in White House – Good for Pakistan or Not?

Few of the people, some within the Pakistani prisons are quite hopeful that having Trump in White House will pressurize the Government to release Imran Khan.



However, it is very likely that Trump administration may not meddle with the internal affairs of Pakistan.

Another major change for the Pakistan with in White House would be the military aid which Pakistan received from the US. Since the military aid would be limited, Islamabad would now be more compelled to have closer ties, especially commercial ties, with Delhi – a hint of which can be found in the statement given by Pakistani Finance minister, a few days ago.

Trump administration may also affect Pakistan’s relations with China and specially the fate of CPEC, as Pakistan may wish to align its alliance with US.

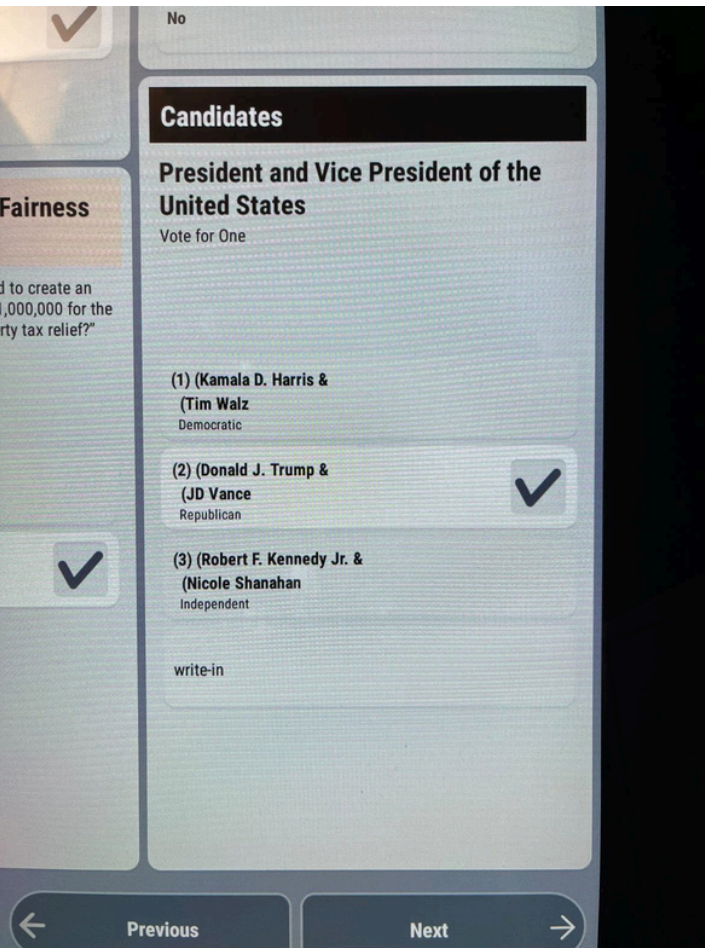

Foreign policy expert Muhammad Faisal added that Pakistan, which had some engagement with the US under Trump due to the Afghanistan conflict, may now receive less attention as the administration grapples with issues like Gaza, Ukraine, and US-China tensions.

“Pakistan’s significance may grow if tensions between the US and Iran escalate,” Washington-based geopolitical commentator Uzair Younus told Al Jazeera. *“In such a scenario, Pakistan could serve as a partner to limit the influence of Iran’s regional proxies.”*

Conclusion

The presence of Trump in the White House is a good omen for the world, in general, but one can never be very sure of the Trump’s stance. Trump generally holds popularity as an erratic president and can upend his own statements and policies. It will be a test of time and the next few months will be crucial in seeing how Trump leads US and whether he upholds his promise of US restraint from the global landscape.
